

Mr. Thomas Bloom

Director, Defense Finance and Accounting Service

Thomas R. Bloom became the director of the Defense Finance and Accounting Service on May 24, 1999. In this capacity, he oversees the day-to-day accounting and finance activities of the Department of Defense. DFAS employs about 19,000 civilians and 2,000 military personnel at five major centers and 20 operating locations throughout the United States and in Europe and the Pacific. The agency processes 9.8 million payments to DoD personnel; 1.2 million commercial invoices; 450,000 travel vouchers/settlements; 500,000 savings bonds issuances; and 120,000 transportation bills of lading paying out \$22 billion a month. DFAS handles accounts for worldwide operations and multidisciplined appropriations of DoD. These financial resources are well in excess of \$1 trillion.

Bloom has extensive experience in finance and accounting. In his former position as GSA's chief financial officer from February 1998 to May 1999, he had oversight responsibility for budgeting, accounting, cash management, payroll, financial reporting, strategic planning and performance measurement and financial responsibility for \$43 billion annually in government-wide procurement.

Former assignments include serving as inspector general at the U.S. Department of Education from 1995 to 1998 where Bloom conducted audits, investigations, managed fraud control programs and designated security services related to programs and operations for the Department. Bloom also served as CFO and assistant secretary for Administration at the Department of Commerce where he was responsible for all financial, administrative and budget management issues from 1993 to 1995.

From 1988 to 1993, Bloom was a senior audit partner and director of governmental services and co-chair of its Financial Institution Practice with the national certified public accounting firm Kenneth Leventhal & Company in its Dallas, Texas and Washington, D.C. offices. As an accounting fellow and later the chief accountant for the Federal Home Loan Bank System from 1985 to 1988, Bloom was the senior accounting and auditing authority for regulation of the troubled thrift industry.

From 1976 to 1985, Bloom was associated with two international accounting firms, rising from junior staff accountant to partner. Bloom is a member of the Advisory Council on Government Auditing Standards and is a past member of the Cost Accounting Standards Board and the Accounting and Auditing Policy Committee for the Federal government.

Bloom earned a bachelor's degree in Business Administration and Accounting from the University of Michigan. He is a certified public accountant.
